We recently had the rare opportunity to interact with  
a newly formed youth structure in the Province.

They realise that they are not the leaders of tomorrow, but the leaders of today, who have the ability to create positive change. They accept that they cannot sit by idly and wait for something to fall into their laps. This resonates well with the Honourable Premier's call for a multi-pronged approach to youth economic empowerment during the State of the Nation Address.

While government will be playing its part in youth development, the clarion call to civil society and the private sector is clear: We need to empower our youth in various ways.

The youth today are displaying the same determination to forge ahead like the hundreds of young people who paid for their lives on June 16<sup>th</sup>, 1976. **"To overcome poverty and the flaws of the economic crisis in our society, we need to envision our social life. We have to free our mind, imagine what has never happened before and write social fiction. We need to imagine things to make them happen. If you don't imagine, it will never happen"**

It is common knowledge that successful education starts in Early Childhood Development. Early childhood is a period in the development of the young child, where environment plays an important role in determining how the child will grow or develop.

There are currently more than nineteen thousand nine hundred (19 900) Early Childhood Development Centres across the country. Limpopo Province has two thousand six hundred and sixteen (2 616) registered Early Childhood Development sites and over one hundred and thirty two thousand (132,825) children are accessing Early Childhood Development registered programmes. Government will, in the coming five years, further increase access of the ECD service through non-centre Based ECD Programmes.

In order to improve the quality of these ECD's the National Department of Social Development has recently conducted an audit of these mushrooming centres to obtain information on the nature and extent of ECD provisioning, services, resources and infrastructure, in order to inform and support ongoing policy and planning initiatives. As we work towards the implementation of a two years compulsory pre-school education, this information will prove to be invaluable as we support these structures in the poorest of communities.

In closure it is important to note that the chasm between the wealthiest and poorest citizens in South Africa still exists.



This dismal situation can only be overcome with the implementation of realistic social responsibility on the side of the business fraternity and mining sector. Government will continue with poverty relief programmes; grants and assistance for the most vulnerable members of society. However, the late Former President Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela had declared that the solution is in our hands. Let us look forward to a month in which we will all use our hands to make a difference in honour and fond remembrance of the first democratically elected president of South Africa.

It is easy to sit and criticize. When time comes to work we can do best if we join hands and move Limpopo forward.

It is my conviction that the Honourable Premier is steadfast in rooting out corruption and mismanagement in this current administration and he has full support in this undertaking. Indeed we can only rise from here. When and where we had fallen, we have learned from our experiences.
